

Course Syllabus

Learning objectives

The dramatic growth in chemical production and trade during the past three decades has raised concerns about the potential risks posed by hazardous chemicals and pesticides. Countries lacking adequate infrastructure to monitor the import and use of these chemicals are particularly vulnerable. In response to these concerns, UNEP and FAO developed and promoted voluntary information exchange programmes in the mid-1980s. Building on these procedures, the Rotterdam Convention creates legally binding obligations for the implementation of the Prior Informed Consent (PIC) procedure, promoting shared responsibility and facilitating information exchange. This course will introduce you to the history and of the Rotterdam Convention and how the PIC procedure functions.

At the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Describe the need for and origins of the Rotterdam Convention.
- **2.** Explain the Prior Informed Consent procedure and other requirements of the Convention.

Content and duration

This online course is comprised of 3 lessons, which provides links to relevant treaty text paragraphs and term concepts of the InforMEA Glossary section. The lessons are organized in interactive modules that combine the course theory with exercises and interactions that will facilitate the learning process.
