Learning objectives

“Air pollution” describes the presence of substances that are artificially introduced into the air. Air pollution stems from gases, which in excess are harmful to human health, buildings, ecosystems and the environment in general.

This course primarily focuses on the problem of long- range transboundary air pollution, mainly in Europe and haze pollution focused on Southeast Asia.

At the end of the course, you will be able to:

1. Explain the consequences of transboundary air pollution
2. Describe key provisions of the Convention on Long-Range Transboundary Air Pollution, its protocols and the ASEAN Agreement on Transboundary Haze Pollution

Content and duration
